Members' Questionnaire 2005 by Robert Oldfield

Firstly, may I take this opportunity to thank everyone who responded - as of 25th August, 89 of you (41%) out of a mailing list of 216 have done so. The survey will be kept open for any latecomers.

I took advice from a retired professional statistician (and NLSME member) who tells me that a response rate of 25 - 33% would be "average" for an organisation such as ours. 41% is "good" and,

given that everyone had an equal chance to reply, may be considered representative of the wishes of the membership who wish to express an opinion.

The responses (and percentages based on the 89 replies received and rounded to the nearest 1%) are herewith:

Question 1 - Your interests.

There is a lot of "meat" here which should provide the basis for much future discussion. On the basis of "very" interested, it is probably no surprise that the highest-scoring activity, the raised track, attracts nearly as much interest as the third and fourth most popular categories (outside speakers at HQ and ground level) taken together. Possibly more surprising is the interest in our <u>own</u> major events, which feature second in the ranking with 41 'hits' and act as a showcase for the Society and bring the various sections together.

Question 2 - **Stewarding at Colney Heath**

Track Steward 97 "turns"
Tea Steward 54 "turns" (perhaps that should be "urns"...)

This year we will be running for 31 weeks out of 52 (an abnormally long season), which at current manning levels of 4 Track Stewards and 2 Tea Stewards requires 124 Track Steward "turns" and 62 Tea Steward ones. There has been SO much goodwill by so many to

undertake extra duties that it looks as if this thorny issue (including the requirement for extra stewarding and the problem of absenteeism) could at last be resolved, bearing in mind that not all loco section members have responded to this survey and that partners of members who tend to be rostered for tea duties do not (as far as I am aware) feature in the totals.

(Outside of this survey, I would like to put forward an overall proposal for 2006, bearing in mind both the above and the recent work conducted by Ian Johnson, Mike Chrisp & Derek Perham).

Question 3 - **Development of facilities at Colney Heath**

Note: the totals will be less than 100% as a number of members expressed no opinion.

Members in favour of...

No development at all	6	(7%)
Ground level track only	12	(15%)
Raised Track extension only	7	(8%)
Ground level and		
Raised Track extension	58	(65%)

It is absolutely clear that the membership wish to see <u>both</u> ground level <u>and</u> raised track make use of the extra land. Extending only one or the other would be unacceptable. There are a number of suggestions for other facilities, too - see comments below.

If possible, should there be pedestrian & public access to the new area?

Yes 34 (38%) No 46 (52%)

It is possible that the "yes" response understates the overall view of the Society since the only other way of accessing the new land would be by train, which for the more elderly, infirm and disabled might not be feasible. Given the stewarding and safely concerns on one hand and the Disability Discrimination Act on the other, and with the vast expertise available within the Society, perhaps it would be possible for the Planning Team to seriously consider some kind of alternative access?

Would YOU be prepared to work on the new facilities?

Yes	34 (38%)
Probably	14 (16%)
Possibly	19 (22%)
No	17 (19%)

In addition, there were a number of interesting ideas & comments made. Some have been shortened/paraphrased. In no particular order:

- 1. Ground level yard for GL5 users, and appreciating the difference between their requirements and those of ground level passenger hauling. (3 members)
- 2. Ground level colour light signalling, presumably including lights at any crossing.
- 3. A raised level lay-by siding at station to facilitate driver breaks.

- 4. A new pond facility, given that the existing one has a finite life before extensive work will be required (2 members) with consideration given to landscaping/attractive gardens, and possibly set aside an area as a memorial garden to the Members who are no longer with us.
- 5. Training & steward training.
- 6. Shop for buying/selling unwanted models, materials etc. (a use for the crew room section of the coach?)
- 7. Improved workshop facilities.
- 8. Display tables around boat pool + extra seating.
- 9. Improve the ground level around the pond by pruning back the trees.
- 10. The existing facilities must not be compromised by new development. (2 members).
- 11. Although it would seem a natural reaction to suggest extending both the raised and ground level tracks, I would question whether the 71/4" track would ever be as popular as the current 31/2" and 5" tracks.
- 12. To save the cost of maintaining 2 sites, move the Club HQ to Tyttenhanger.
- 13. Re-vamp (raised track) steaming bay and have direct passenger car access to the track.
- 14. Ground level track must permit continuous running.
- 15. Support of any plan publicised to and then agreed by the membership, costed, surveyed and managed by an experienced project manager. (3 members)
- 16. Regain our position as the longest and best (raised) track in the country.
- 17. Effectively separate trains from the Public with fencing or whatever.
- 18. Safeguard ground condition of existing car park.
- 19. Make HQ meetings available on DVD for the benefit of those not able to attend.

How to find us

The exhibition will be held at the Warwickshire Exhibition Centre, Fosse Way, nr. Leamington Spa, Warwickshire, on the junction of the A425/B4455, which is readily accessible from most parts of the country. It is at the centre of the national motorway network, with the M1, M6, M40, M42, M45 and M69 all nearby; Leamington Spa Railway Station is only 3.5 miles away. Coventry Airport is only 6 miles away at Baginton; while Birmingham Airport, with its domestic and international flights, is just 30 minutes away.


ROUTES TO THE EXHIBITION CENTRE:
From the South via M1: Leave the M1 at Exit 17 (M45). Follow the M45 to its end, then at the roundabout, follow the A45 (straight on). At this junction go straight across on to the B4455 Fosse Way. Follow the B4455 for 5.1 miles passing through three crossroads to arrive at the

From the North via MI: Leave the MI at Exit 21 and take the M69/A46 right to its junction with the A45 and at this roundabout turn to the left taking the A45 signed London. After a few hundred yards take the slip road on the left marked A423 Banbury. Follow the A423 going straight across two roundabouts for approximately 3.7 miles to Princethorpe. At Princethorpe, turn right onto the B4455 Fosse Way for 5.1 miles passing through three crossroads to arrive

From the North via M6: Leave the M6 at Exit 2 following Coventry signs, then at the roundabout take the A46 signed Coventry (E&S) and Airport to its junction with the A45. At this roundabout turn to the left taking the A45 signed London. After a few hundred yards take the slip road on the left marked A423 Banbury. Follow the A423 going straight across two roundabouts for approximately 3.7 miles to Princethorpe.
